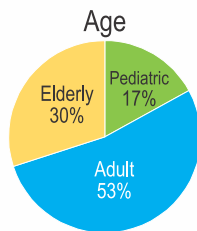
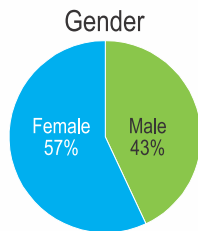
# Year in Review

From April 1, 2018 to March 31, 2019 Brock CHC continued to offer quality programs and services to the community of Brock Township and surrounding areas. Some highlights include:

## Primary Health Care

Clients Served **2,796**

Service Provider Interactions **18,302**



- The Primary Health Care Program (PHCP) continues to provide quality primary care services at both Cannington and Beaverton primary care sites. New clients are welcome.
- Dr. Bardai joined Brock CHC's Primary Health Care Program in April 2018.
- Flu clinics were organized at various locations in Brock Township, including Brock High School, senior residences and Brock Food Bank.
- Ontario Shores began providing service in our facility in October 2018 with an 18-month CBT (Cognitive Behavioural Therapy) Pilot Program.

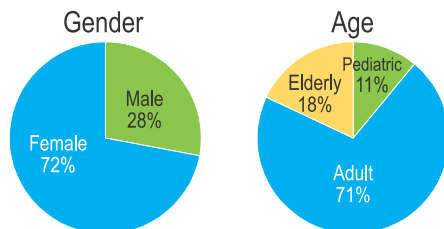
- The Wellness Centre at Brock High School continues to be utilized by the students. A Brock CHC Nurse Practitioner and Youth and Community Health Worker provide health care and support services Thursday afternoons, and participate in other events and group classes at the school.
- In recognition of Community Health and Well-being Week, Brock CHC launched a "Go Bananas" campaign, where free bananas were made available to clients in each of our primary care locations with information on the health benefits of eating a banana a day.
- Brock CHC continues to collaborate with Durham Region Public Health to obtain vaccines and medications for disease prevention to increase accessibility for our client population.
- A new ECG machine has allowed for ECGs to be done at both primary care offices with a preliminary report sent to the cardiologist.
- Nurse Practitioners are offering primary care services in the home for patients with transportation issues or inequities within the social determinants of health. They are also providing collaborative home visits with the Diabetes Education team, the Registered Nurse and the Social Worker.

- Brock CHC hosted a palliative care workshop from the CE LHIN in March 2019. 10 Brock CHC staff attended, as well as 15 staff from agencies in the community.
- Brock CHC is preparing to transition its current electronic medical records to TELUS Health PS Suites EMR. This will take place in August 2019.

## Registered Dietitian and Social Worker

Clients Served **393**

Service Provider Interactions **980**



- The Registered Dietitian at Brock CHC continues to provide individual nutrition counselling (pre-natal to late adulthood) at both of the Cannington and Beaverton primary care sites, as well as at home visits.
- Seven group sessions were conducted throughout the year, including two nutrition talks/resource provision to parents at the Canada Prenatal Nutrition Program (CPNP) – known as Food 4 Thought in Durham Region; three cooking classes at Fisher's Your Independent Grocer (in collaboration with the Diabetes Education Program Registered Dietitian); one



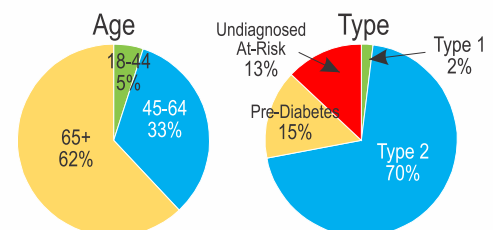
food labeling nutrition talk/resource provision at the United Church Women's group at St. Andrew's United Church in Beaverton; and participation at the Brock High School Wellness Fair.

- Katherine Whiteside resigned her position as Social Worker in September 2018 to pursue an exciting opportunity with Georgian College.
- Brock CHC welcomed a new Social Worker in November of 2018. Chrissy Vandenberg, MSW, RSW came to us with seven years of experience in mental health, in addition to experience in caregiver support and long-term care.
- The Social Worker continues to provide mental health support, and foster relations and partnerships with other community support agencies.
- Group programs are currently being developed based on the needs of the community.
- Outreach was provided to Brock elementary schools for their Welcome to Kindergarten Program, in collaboration with allied health organizations.

## Diabetes Education

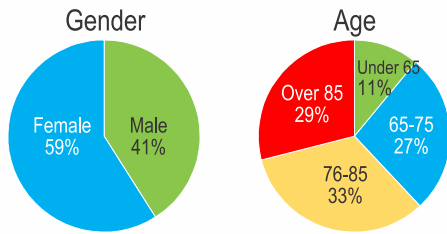


- The Diabetes Education Program (DEP) continues to support clients in their diabetes management. Initial assessments, follow-up appointments and monthly weight checks are offered at both the Cannington and Beaverton primary care sites, as well as in Sunderland. Home visits are also available if needed.
- The DEP team has offered workshops to the community as well as to other community organizations to better support those living with diabetes.
- Tziporah (Tzippy) Bernstein, Registered Dietitian, was hired in January 2019 to cover Silvia Chu's maternity leave.

## Geriatric Assessment

Clients Served **159**

- The Brock Geriatric Assessment Program (BGAP) continues to support the seniors, caretakers, and primary care providers in our community. The program provides comprehensive assessment of seniors living at home or in retirement residences with complex health care needs.
- The BGAP team works closely with Brock CHC's Seniors and Community Health Worker and collaborates with other health service and community agencies in referring seniors for further assessment, information, or health and social services.
- Due to excellent service provision, the BGAP team has been able to increase service targets.
- Behaviour Support Ontario launched a pilot project with the CE LHIN and Carea CHC. Brock CHC has been able to access a BSO worker in North Durham, housed one day per week at our office and working closely with the BGAP team.
- Julie Carthew, Nurse Practitioner, provided a presentation entitled "Laughter is the Best Medicine" at the MP/MPP Seniors Seminar, as well as to two seniors groups at the Manilla Hall and Sunderland Legion.
- Julie Carthew, Nurse Practitioner, resigned in February 2019 to take a position closer to her home. We are currently looking for a suitable candidate to fill that permanent position.

## Ontario Telemedicine Network

- The Ontario Telemedicine Network (OTN) at Brock CHC continues to be well utilized by local residents for videoconferencing appointments with outside agencies including Centre for Addiction and Mental Health, Ontario Shores for Mental Health, Royal Victoria Hospital, Sick Kids, University Health Network, Sunnybrook Hospital, St. Michael's Hospital, Scarborough Hospital, Allevio Pain Management Clinic, Apollo Cannabis Clinic and child psychiatry practices. OTN provides access to specialists and health care providers without unnecessary time, cost and stress of travel to the city.
- Usage of Telederm has increased to over 100 clients. OTN's Telederm program allows primary care providers to consult with an Ontario dermatologist, receiving timely advice for patients within an average of 1-2 days, often eliminating the need for an in-person referral. It is available at no cost to healthcare providers or patients, and is part of Ontario's publicly funded healthcare system.

## Community Development / Health Promotion

- 24 community-based exercise and wellness program offerings are coordinated weekly that continue to draw local and surrounding area residents. In addition to maintaining participants' health and wellness, our programs aim to improve balance, strength and stability, improve vascular health, and reduce social isolation. Highlights in 2018: Country Line Dancing celebrated its 10th anniversary and the launch of Move, Groove and Improve, a 12-week pilot program – a partnership with Multiple Sclerosis Society of Durham, March of Dimes and Parkinson Canada.
- Cooking skills classes are offered to youth in Beaverton, Cannington and Sunderland with five

sessions monthly during the school year, and in partnership with the Township of Brock's March Break and Summer Day Camps.

- An interactive health fair at Brock High School in October saw students engage in health-related games and discussions with Brock CHC Nurse Practitioners, Dietitians, Social Worker and Community Health Workers, as well as allied agencies including Durham Region Public Health, Lakeridge Health Pinewood Centre, Canadian Mental Health Association and Brock Township Libraries.
- Garden beds at our Primary Health Care location in Cannington offer clients and community members easy access to fresh vegetables.
- The Youth and Community Health Worker serves as Chair of the Brock Youth Centre Board of Directors, supporting them in many initiatives to build youth capacity including the Cool Cow (a social enterprise that sells ice cream products) and EDGE (Entrepreneurial Development Generating Employment) Pitch Competition.
- Free Community Holiday Skates were hosted by Brock CHC in December and March in Cannington, Sunderland and Beaverton arenas.
- In partnership with Brock High School, Adventureworks was brought in for Grade 9 Orientation to welcome students and to provide opportunities for them to get to know one another through team building activities.



- Brock CHC clients who are food insecure are accessing good food boxes through a partnership with Nourish Community Hub.
- The Seniors and Community Health Worker serves as Chair of the Durham Elder Abuse

Network (DEAN), offering education, prevention, professional networking, and support in the prevention of elder abuse. Additionally, DEAN has successfully launched campaigns such as the production and distribution of over 6000 Seniors Safety calendars, and the Secret Santa for Seniors program which delivered over 1,200 gifts across Durham and 140 locally in Brock.

- DEAN, Brock CHC, The Region of Durham, and Elder Abuse Ontario received funding to coordinate and host Elder Abuse Simulation Training throughout Durham Region, Peterborough County, Simcoe County and York Region. Jennifer Josephson and Tammy Rankin provided education on Elder Abuse 101 and re-enacted two real life elder abuse scenarios to encourage use of intervention techniques. The project concluded with a one-day conference held in York Region which featured a video of the training session to offer training and intervention techniques for service providers.
- DEAN launched its Emergency Meal Assistance Program in partnership with Community Care Durham, Oshawa Seniors Centres and Whitby Seniors. Frozen or fresh meals can be accessed by a DEAN member at any of these locations for a senior in need. DEAN covers the cost of these meals. Delivery is also available.
- The Seniors and Community Health Worker, jointly with the Durham Region Police Services' (DRPS) Community Officer, continues to offer support and outreach to local seniors in response to "checks on well-being" requests received by DRPS. Additionally, educational presentations are offered to seniors at community gatherings, service groups, and at non-profit housing in North Durham on fraud and scams, as well as seniors' safety issues.
- The CD-HP team hosted a four-month placement for Abby Harper, a Recreation and Leisure Program student from Sir Sanford Fleming College. Ms. Harper was effectively immersed in all aspects of community-based programming with groups of youth and seniors, and participated in interdisciplinary home visits with isolated seniors to gain a true appreciation for the CHC Model of Care and the value of considering the social determinants of health in all interactions.
- Brock CHC continues to provide space for community agencies to meet with their clients in

Brock Township, including Alzheimer Society Durham Region, Community Living Durham North, Durham College, Lakeridge Health Pinewood Centre, March of Dimes Canada and North House.

- The North Durham Connect table continues to connect people who are experiencing acutely elevated or crisis situations to the services they need in a timely way.
- Seasonal agricultural workers in Brock Township continue to receive health-related support from Brock CHC's Health Promoter and Primary Health Care team supported by professional translation services during appointments.
- Brock CHC is represented on the Durham Council on Aging to inform and guide the implementation of the Age-friendly Durham Strategy and Action Plan, including housing directories for each municipality; and an Anti-Ageism Campaign.
- Brock CHC and the Ontario Oral Health Alliance – Haliburton-Kawartha Lakes-Brock Chapter continued to advocate to local MPP Laurie Scott for affordable and accessible dental care for low income seniors.

- Brock CHC and Community Care Durham (Brock) hosted a "Holiday Open House" on December 5, 2018 at 1 Cameron St. E. in Cannington. Volunteers and members of the public were welcomed.



- The Joint Health and Safety Committee continues to meet monthly and is committed to improving health and safety conditions in the workplace.
- A staff Quality Management Committee was formed to work in partnership with the Board Quality Committee to provide leadership on quality of service and performance at Brock CHC.
- Brock CHC's Administrative Office acquired additional space at Holy Family Catholic School. Interior security doors were installed to separate the room from the school. The new space will be used for Board and staff meetings, storage and OTN appointments. This will free up existing space for Physiotherapy.
- Brock CHC welcomed Peter Elliott, Negin Khorasani, Carol Metcalfe, Pat Shaw, Barton St-Denis and Norm Wilson to the Board of Directors.
- Board Governance training was provided by Laridae Communications in January 2019.
- In February 2019, the Health Minister announced major changes to Ontario's healthcare system. The creation of a new central agency, called Ontario Health, will consolidate Ontario's 14 local health integration networks, Cancer Care Ontario, eHealth Ontario, and several other organizations. Ontario Health Teams will be

## Corporate / Governance

- J. McPherson continues participation on the CE LHIN Sub Region Planning Table.
- Brock CHC has submitted the 2018/19 Quality Improvement Plan (QIP) to Health Quality Ontario. Client satisfaction surveys were conducted and evaluated for 2018-2019 as part of our commitment to quality management.
- Ontario Indigenous Cultural Safety Training has been completed by 12 staff to date. Directors on the Board have committed to completing training modules most relevant to their role with Brock CHC.
- A Staff Retreat was held in November 2018. The focus was on Brock CHC's mission/vision/values, the principles of community health centres, health equity and privacy training. Staff also participated in teambuilding activities.
- Mahir Bhatt was hired as a summer student to review accreditation indicators and determine what the organization needs to do to prepare for accreditation. He also reviewed the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA) to determine our legislative requirements.

formed locally, and healthcare providers will work as one coordinated team in an effort to improve the patient and caregiver experience and strengthen local services. Brock CHC has been involved in discussions with the Alliance of Healthier Communities and local health organizations.

- An arduous “medical records project” got underway with plans to prepare all paper medical records for secure, off-site storage and destruction with Iron Mountain. The project is now complete.

## Capital Project

- Brock CHC's capital project will see construction of a 21,000 square foot health care facility for the residents of Brock Township and surrounding areas. The new centre will accommodate organizational programs and services. It will also provide a community health hub for Durham's northern communities, increasing access to allied health care services and community organizations.
- Brock CHC continues to work closely with the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care's Health Capital Investment Branch and the Central East Local Health Integration Network on the capital project. While the Ministry of Health Capital Investment Branch is funding the majority of the

building costs (estimated at \$9.7 million dollars), Brock CHC is responsible for the non-shared costs of the project, currently estimated at \$450,000. Brock CHC has secured The Regional Municipality of Durham's support and financial contribution of 25 per cent of the community component of the capital project, approximately \$100,000. We are currently working on a cost-share agreement to achieve approval for Stage 3.2.

- Marissa Soumalias was contracted as the Capital Campaign Consultant to work with Brock CHC's Board of Directors, community volunteers and staff to develop a multi-faceted capital campaign and fundraising strategy to achieve our capital campaign target.
- Brock CHC has recruited the Capital Campaign Cabinet, a group of strong volunteer community leaders who will be the driving force behind the fundraising efforts for the capital project. Cabinet members include:

# Community Partners and Coalitions

Brock CHC is a member of a Community of Practice initiative, led by the Regional Municipality of Durham, that offers Free Tax Clinics to low income residents across Durham. North House coordinated free tax clinics across North Durham, 2 of which were held at Brock CHC's Administrative Office. Marketing efforts through primary health care practice, community program participants and local outreach at Brock Food Bank were proven successful. North House was able to complete 22 tax returns (2017 Tax Year) resulting in over \$75,500 in benefits, of which \$39,164 were Child Tax Benefits. For the 2018 Tax Year, 43 tax returns were completed with \$162,073 in benefits returned to Brock and area residents, of which \$68,483 were Child Tax Benefits.
